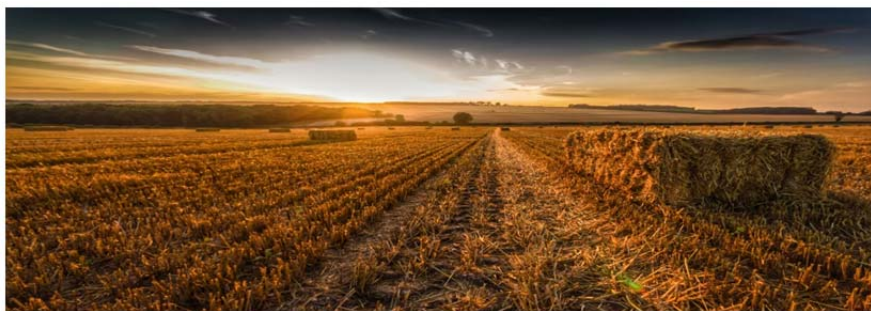

Photo competition

Entry has closed for the second Capturing the East Riding photography competition, and 165 amateur photographers have sent in 450 entries. This year's theme is @Work, Rest and Play – Capturing Life in the East Riding. As well as rural shots, there are photos of an array of festivals and events, including Beverley Folk Festival, Driffield Steam Rally, Bridlington's Scooter Rally, races at Beverley Racecourse and the re-enactment of the Battle of Stamford Bridge.

Judges must now choose the best photographs which depict people at work, rest or play in the local area. Participants have the chance to win one of many great prizes, with judges deciding on the winners in February. The top 100 photographs will be exhibited at the Beverley Art Gallery, Goole Museum, Pocklington Arts Centre and The Spa Gallery, Bridlington, in 2015-16.

Electronic agenda

New laws allowing town and parish councils to send agendas electronically rather than by post have been welcomed. The Government hopes the powers created using the Sustainable Communities Act will help deliver significant savings to grass-roots councils.

Award scooped by fuel poverty fighters

Humber and Wolds Rural Community Council has received a national Community Action Award for their Greener Schools project.

The awards are run by national fuel poverty charity NEA in partnership with British Gas and the Department of Energy and Climate Change. They recognise excellence and innovation in the fields of tackling fuel poverty and improving energy efficiency amongst vulnerable households.

Around 12,000 households in the East Riding of Yorkshire are experiencing the impacts of fuel poverty, which are exacerbated in rural communities.

Community orchard ap-peel

The Conservation Volunteers are looking for parish councils and community groups who would like to establish community orchards. Perhaps you have an area of land that could accommodate a variety of native fruit trees.

The Conservation Volunteers will help you apply for funding of up to 75 per cent of total costs, select and supply the most appropriate varieties, and provide volunteer support to help plant and maintain the trees. Planting would take place during National Tree Week 2015. The application deadline is Tuesday, 31 March.

The Conservation Volunteers would also like to hear from parish councils or community groups who need help with conservation and environmental improvement projects. They can help find funding or just provide a willing volunteer workforce to 'muck in'. Parish websites

Many parish councils would like a website but do not have someone with the necessary knowledge, or the budget to pay someone. East Riding of Yorkshire Council provides a free toolkit which is used by over 40 parish councils to develop their own website.

The software has recently been updated and includes:

- better compatibility with newer operating systems
- support for both smartphones and tablets
- editing content as you view the website
- enhanced security protection.

The move to mobile

Compared with the last four years, East Riding of Yorkshire Council's website saw its largest volume of traffic over the festive period. There were 89,177 page views between Christmas Day and New Year's Day. Of this, traffic from mobile devices like smartphones and tablets was almost 55 per cent, compared with just 13 per cent in 2011.

Website use is growing, with over 2.17 million visits to the website in 2014, viewing 6.2 million web pages. This compares with 1.93 million visits in the previous year.

Broadband East Riding

The project continues to roll out faster broadband to many parts of the East Riding. Superfast broadband is now available to over 24,000 homes and businesses, and is on target to reach over 42,000 properties by December.

The East Riding has recently secured additional funds from the national broadband programme to deliver a second phase of the project. This should allow the project to run till 2017.

Defra confirms ACRE Network funding

Action with Communities in Rural England (ACRE), acts as the umbrella organisation for 38 community councils across England.

After rejecting proposals that could have seen funding withdrawn, Defra said that it would maintain its £2.3m investment in the ACRE Network for 2015/16.

The decision came after more than 13,000 people signed ACRE's petition calling for funding to be maintained. At the campaign's height, the petition was being signed by more than 1,000 people every day.



Trees in Hook

Hook Parish Council applied to the Woodland trust for a tree pack for the Gala Field in Hook in autumn. Their application was successful and they recently received an all-year-round colour pack of 400 saplings.

They intend to plant the trees in the Gala Field in Hook, which is unused. They also hope to create a woodland area with cycle path to encourage use by families, children and educational visits.

Dance on the map

Arts Council England has provided funding for three years for this new initiative in the East Riding. The first strand of the project is youth dance, and will develop a community dance programme for young people aged 11 to 18. There is no other form of youth dance work taking place in the East Riding.

The project will provide opportunities to take part in workshops and projects. It is hoped it will engage young people and put dance as a focal part of community life beyond the lifespan of the project. It will take place in local venues, as well as link with dance programming at some of the East Riding's theatres and festivals. It will help further develop routes for young people wanting to progress and take dance further, building creative skills, experience and fitness.

Youth dance groups will take place for 12 weeks starting in week commencing 23 February in four areas of the East Riding:

- The Spa, Bridlington on Mondays
- Memorial Hall, Beverley on Tuesdays
- Woldgate College, Pocklington on Tuesdays
- The Courtyard, Goole on Saturdays
